

SFBAPG 50th Celebration!

So, hold that date (and any others we may choose [just kidding!]). In the meantime, here are a few fun facts for you.

Although we are celebrating the SFBAPG 50th anniversary, the Guild has been active longer that that, since 1954 actually. Here are a few other things that happened in 1954:

- IBM announced a vacuum tube "electronic" brain that could perform 10 million operations an hour (computers are now measured in "gigaflops." i.e. 1,000,000,000 operations per second and speeds in the 100's of gigaflops are not uncommon).



Building Giant Number 5 for Vallejo

Each year the Vallejo 4th of July Committee commissions a giant puppet from Magical Moonshine Theatre. Past giants have included Mariano G. Vallejo, his wife Benicia, his horse, and Lady Liberty. This year the committee selected the USS Mariano G. Vallejo nuclear submarine, which was built in Vallejo in the mid sixties at the Mare Island Naval Shipyard. The sub itself was 425 feet long, was launched in 1965 and decommissioned in 1995. In between those dates the sub ran numerous top secret missions during the cold war.

In setting out to create a submarine puppet, I wanted to try to preserve the feel of the original sub, while making it a fun parade puppet, not just a large object to carry. started with the original shape of the sub, scaled down, and realized that it would either be too long or too skinny for my vision of what the puppet sub would do, so I ended up truncating the design, making it shorter and stouter than the original would be in scaled down form. Part of my fun puppet design included a dozen "Ken" fashion dolls in Navy uniform that could salute from the deck (done) and a periscope with blinking eyeball (done, with eye mechanism created by guild member Kevin Menegus.) In addition I had envisioned a pinwheel propeller to turn in the wind (still not done as of this writing) and bubbles coming out of the rear of the sub. The bubble machine we got turned out to blow bubbles up instead of out, which kind of fed into an additional street theatre innovation of having a submerged Soviet sub (you can only see the "sail" of the sub, the rest of the sub is under the payement) with the bubbles coming out of the top of the Soviet sub (done, except that the bubble machine stopped working after about 3 minutes of use!) With this idea, the US sub can "chase" the Soviet sub along the parade route.

The sub structure is made from plastic tubing hoops, connected together by pvc pipes (the white pipes used for plumbing.) The pvc itself is strong but not rigid enough so there is a very light wooden frame to help hold the 25 foot long sub horizontal and mostly flat. Then the entire structure is covered by a fabric cover, completing the sub. At the time of this writing, the sub is almost finished. Most critical will be a stress test later this week when we take the sub outside for the first time. Vallejo is a city on the Bay with strong winds, so we always have to make sure the giants can handle the wind, and that the operators who will manipulate the puppet can keep control of it. Two years ago when we took the 14 foot tall horse puppet outside for the first time, we realized that for safety we would have to have 2 spotters with lines up to the horses head for security, something we might not have been prepared for without the test.

The entire building of the sub puppet was intended to be a community project, but to date there has been little (but some!) community participation. We have been given a very nice workshop space in the Ferry building in Vallejo, but due to paperwork, lawyers and insurance issues, we only got it a week before the parade, so most of the work on the puppet was done at our home studio and not at a public place where we might have garnered more public interest. Oh well. Much of the time I find I can get more done by myself as opposed to trying to help others to make the

Janet Bradley, founder of Tears of Joy Puppet Theatre February 24, 1943 - April 26, 2011

The puppet community has suffered a tremendous loss with the sudden passing of Janet Bradley, co-founder of Tears of Joy Puppet Theatre in Portland, Oregon. On her last day at Tears of Joy, Janet shared a hearty laugh with co-workers, then sat at her desk to continue the mission she had started forty years before. There was no warning that soon her life would be cut short by a ruptured aorta. Her boisterous laugh, vibrant energy, and passion for puppetry will be missed by so many people.

In 1971, Janet Bradley and her then-husband, Reg Bradley, cofounded Tears of Joy in Honolulu, Hawaii; but soon it became clear that the company needed to tour, and Hawaii was not a practical home base. So, two years later, Tears of Joy moved to Vancouver, WA and set up shop on Janet's family farm. Around 1980, the company gained non-profit status, and then about a decade later, it became a resident company at the Portland Center for the Performing Arts. Tears of Joy's remarkable evolution from a mom-and-pop traveling show to a mid-size resident company in a big-city performing arts center, is especially notable and rare in the world of puppetry arts.

Much of the credit for Tears of Joy's longevity and success goes to Janet Bradley. Janet started out as a puppet designer and performer, and then during the last twenty years, worked tirelessly as an administrator. As a former social studies high school teacher, Janet understood what it took to engage, entertain and educate children. She also saw that there were many areas of the Pacific Northwest, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Alaska where children were never exposed to live theater; and she knew that Tears of Joy could fill this niche and serve the disadvantaged. It is a tribute to Janet that in the last forty years, hundreds of thousands of children - actually, one million just in the past ten years -- have been touched by the award-winning shows that Tears of Joy brought to their schools. Janet was a model of determination as she picked up the phone to raise more money and secure more bookings.

Besides being the Managing Director for Tears of Joy, Janet also was very active in her local guild -- the Columbia Association of Puppeteers -- and she served as the Chair of the Budget and Finance Committee for Puppeteers of America. Her dedication to the puppetry arts was profound.





Janet's Celebration of Life was held on Monday, May 16, 2011 at the Newmark Theatre in Portland, Oregon. Hundreds of people turned out to say good-bye to a dear friend, sister, mother and grandmother. The tributes expressed through poetry, song, dance and puppetry were a beautiful send-off for a life that was well lived.


