Two Graphic Novels from the teen section of my local libraries, which might be of interest to certain Guild puppeteers reviewed by Elisheva

(Note, graphic novels are books written comic book style. Nothing new, we had 'Classic Comics' when I was a kid, later renamed 'Classics Illustrated' to avoid the taint of being a comic book during the horrified mothers' campaign to clean up comic books which resulted in The Code of Decency. Mad Comics also was renamed about then to Mad Magazine.

Warning There is nothing warm and fuzzy, cute, or much humor in these graphic novels, despite the reputation of the author of one and the lead character of the other! Not for everyone, they are quite dark.

"Pinocchio-Vampire Slayer-and the Great Puppet Theater" by Dusty Higgins, artist, and Van Jensen, writer, SLG Publishing, 2010. This is Volume 2 of the Pinocchio Vampire series. (I haven't seen Volume 1- named one of the 2010 Top Graphic Novels for Teens by the Young Adult Library Services Association and about which Publishers Weekly says, "This is not the sentimentalized Disney version of the story: the protagonist of this book is one tough little puppet."- in which Geppeto is dead, [apparently} slain by vampires.) Now in volume 2 Pinocchio continues his quest to avenge the death of his Papa and rid the world of vampires, aided by his family of unstrung marionettes. Will he let his anger consume him? Contains a nifty pirate ship battle.

"Jim Hensen's Tale of Sand" The lost screenplay by Jim Henson and Jerry Juhl, as realized by Ramon K. Perez.

Another Graphic novel! Another Race through the Dark Side! To quote the back of the book, "Between 1967 and 1974, Jim Henson and his longtime writing partner Jerry Juhl developed three drafts of a screenplay for a feature length film entitled 'Tale of Sand.' It was during the development of the later drafts of the screenplay that Jim Henson became involved in the production of

'Sesame Street' and 'The Muppet Show', and left behind the experimental filmmaking of his youth to concentrate of the creations that would in time make him a household name. 'Tale of Sand' remained in the vaults of The Jim Henson Company as the only feature-length screenplay written by Henson that he was never able to produce during his lifetime."

The story apparently is autobiographical by Jim about his obstacle race through the desert for an unknown reason, to achieve he knows not what! I was very strongly reminded of the old short story, "The Most Dangerous Game" in which a man became stalked by a bored hunter. I had to look at the first pages of the story twice to figure out what was happening. In this section, most of the panel went horizontal across both pages. The book contains some photos of Jim and of Jerry. A little Guild History: Jerry Jule lived in Oakland and met Jim at a P of A National Festival in Asilomar Ca in 1961. Lettie Schubert was festival director and very pregnant with David, her eldest child. Jim and Jane were carrying their baby around in a back pack. Jerry very soon moved East to work with Jim. Frank Oz, also recruited by Jim, had to remain in Oakland to finish high school before going East.

Nymbol's Puppetry 101 - Bill Cass

After a short history of different types of puppetry, Master Puppeteer Bill Cass will teach you the 5 basics of hand puppetry and help you find your own character, voice, and mannerisms so you can breathe life into a puppet. There will be a short performance at the end of class that will be open to all attendees of Faerie Con and video of the class performance will be online to share. Ages 8+ to Adults

Steampunk Crow - Molly Stanton

Mysterious and magical, crows are a quintessential fairy bird. The piece we will create will be a dynamic dance between the magical and the mundane, the natural and mechanical. Using a few crow photos the class will explore simple hand building techniques to create the basic crow shape. Other techniques you will learn include sculpting detailed feathers, working with polyester surface powders to create metallic effects, and working metal and glass into polymer clay projects. The class is appropriate for all skill levels. The focus will be on creativity and exploration as we work simple steps to create some steampunk magic!

Word Weaver Workshop- Create and Tell a Story in an Hour & a Half - Mark Lewis Get ready for "Full Contact Creativity" and join 2-Time Emmy Award-Winning storyteller Mark Lewis as you create your own story and learn to tell it like a professional! Be ready for fun as Mark teaches you the tricks of the trade in this hands-on Workshop. Mark is first and foremost a storyteller. His 40 years of professional experience have earned him a performance on The Tonight Show and most recently roles on Grimm and Leverage. His goal is to re-awaken the art of storytelling in the world of today and to re-introduce this world to its imagination. Come and play!

I received an email from New Jersey from Patti Simone who had acquired about 16 marionettes in New Jersey. Also a group of photo negatives and some prints, one showing a male puppeteer apparently doing a solo marionette performance, and another of a female, with head not in photo, so no clues who she was.

On the back of one photo was the name, T. Star Chamberlain, which we figured was either a puppeteer or a photographer, with a street address in Oakland. Patti thought it was Oakland, New Jersey, but it turned out to be CALIFORNIA's Oakland.

The Oakland Tribune, Dec 12, 1905, page seven, mentions a play being presented Dec 14th for Santa Clara Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church featuring a chorus and a cast of 18---the information is sketchy here----was this 18 actors including T. Star Chamberlain, or 18 puppets? Later we know for sure that there were puppets used by him.




