Hi, my name is Sandra Starr of Starr Players and The Company of the Unicorn. I have been presenting puppetry in many forms professionally since 1970. My credo has always been to thrill an audience with the joys of a loving nurturing life expressed as racially free as possible – a lot of anthropomorphizing. I am now 80 and I have thought I had retired from the puppet world of presentation. But Terry Johnson, who is the charge woman for "Following Francis – Francis in the Schools",

asked me to create an 8' to 10' version of Mother Nature who would move in a parade with live petting zoo animals and a variety of theatrical characters for underserved children and families in Richmond. How can one say "no" to that? I thought about the larger puppet heads that I already have that I could use. I remembered a lovely

African American Angel I had made many years ago. With several months of demanding work (I also work at a school M-F and teach 10 piano students virtually and do 9 hours a week volunteering) I was able to create my vision of her as this youthful lovely woman holding a white dove in one hand and a sparkling



(battery powered) wand in the other hand. She wears green of course. I have good friends who were able to design with me and make a very strong rolling base that she could easily move with. Happily Terry found a delightful dancer who was more than qualified to bring her to life for these events and radiate blessings and love to the gathered audiences They will be sharing these events in April as well as the ones that were presented in March.

I am amazed she took form with such a personae of her own. It has taken me a while to recover from the birthing however but who cares.

HMTC This Week: Huey and Louee's puppet show

Over the summer, Hanford Multicultural Theater Company was awarded an Arts and Accessibility Grant from the California Arts Council and the National Arts and Disability Center. The grant supported a project that promotes the inclusion of our challenged population in the artistic world.

At 7 p.m. this Sunday, Nov. 29, the project will be available on HMTC's YouTube channel. See "Don't Just Look," a puppet show on film, the grant supported project.

"Don't Just Look" is a puppet show for all ages. It is a social awareness story featuring Huey, the chicken puppet, and his friend Louee, the physically challenged turtle puppet. A slice of life puppet play with a Good Samaritan concept. Also, embedded on the film is closed captions and sign language interpreters.

Mark Saltzman, from Kiwuppit Studios and on staff with HMTC, workshopped and trained the main puppeteers for the show. The plan was to perform the show at the theater. However, it needed to be re-imagined with safety in mind during the pandemic. The plus on this, is that this allowed HMTC to explore the project as a film. This film experience has been positive and HMTC is considering additional film projects.

Ricardo Sierra and Christopher De la Rosa are the puppeteer leads. Their gusto in working under restrictive conditions is admirable. Auxiliary characters were performed by Charlotte Young, John Young, and Josh Gilles. Omar Pimentel was engaged to do his multiple voices talent. Vizual Voice assisted in sign interpretation with local signers Sean Hopper and Alex Stimpson.

Restrictions thwarted the usual rehearsal process with this project. Nonetheless, HMTC took the challenge, followed guidelines, and kept in contact with NADC representative to stay the course to a final production with safety.

In addition, a successful rehearsal entitled me to bring out the podcast equipment and ten-foot corded microphones. We discussed the restrictive rehearsal process, and how the pandemic restrictions affects all artists. This audio can be accessed on our HMTC Behind the Scenes Podcast.

All in all, challenges make completion of a project all the more satisfying.

Our Amazing Puppet World: Bil Baird




on August 15,1904 in Grand Island, NE.

His interest in puppets began at age

eight, when his father made him a simple string puppet. By the age of fourteen, Baird was making his own puppets and giving performances of "Treasure Island" in the attic of his parent's Mason City home.

What exactly is a puppet? According to Bil Baird, as defined in his book "The Art of the Puppet," a puppet is "an inanimate figure that is made to move by human effort (not



mechanized) before an audience." Puppets are figures constructed so that various parts can be moved to imitate imaginary or actual characters. They may or may not resemble human beings but are generally given exaggerated human characteristics.

Besides the book that he wrote he also was well known for his sidekick Charlemagne the lion.

Besides his sidekick Charlemagne, He loved puppets so much that he founded Baird's marionettes in 1934 and they did their very first performance at the Chicago World's Fair. He was also instrumental in puppet productions in traveling shows, movies and TV. He also even ran a marionette theater in New York for 10 years.

Baird and his "little friends", as he called them, touched the lives of millions of people as they worked the nightclubs, city streets, Broadway stages, World's Fairs, television, Hollywood films, his own New York City puppet theater and other venues. Baird's puppets participated in the Macy's day parade for several years. Bill's wife Cora Eisenberg was also a bit of a puppeteer herself. She was the hands behind the Lonely Goatherd Scene in a film in 1965, The Sound of Music. That same



year Baird published The Art of the Puppet. Sadly Cora died in 1967. Baird continued working in New York with his marionettes until he passed away in 1987.

Bairds creative legacy and accomplishments are recognized and preserved at the **Charles H. MacNider Art Museum** in Mason City, Iowa. He was a very

creative and energetic puppeteer ,who enjoyed sharing his accomplishments with the world, so everyone could laugh and smile and enjoy Bill Baird's special talents with his "little friends."
