In 2024 the guild turns 70 and we are CELEBRATING, starting with the amazing, fantastical Puppetathlon in January or February (date TBD). In the Puppetathlon, the best puppet athletes in the world will compete in a hilariously grueling competition, demonstrating the superbness of the Tabletop art form at its finest.

They will be handmade (by you, select guild members) in a two day workshop November 4th and 5th at the Vallejo studio of Tree Bartlett! The workshop will be led by expert puppet builder, Mary Nagler, whom the guild is flying in from the East Coast for the workshop. Mary has an exceptional list of puppet building experiences and knows the tricks of the trade, so those lucky enough to get into this workshop will be learning skills applicable to all kinds of puppet building (the secrets of the masters!) Mary has built puppets for The Puppet Heap (Muppets) the Rick Lyon Studio, creator of Ave. Q; film, television and live performances. Her credits would take up too much room in the newsletter but you get the idea. Mary is an excellent teacher!

AND WHERE, YOU ASK, WILL THESE PUPPETATHLETES COME FROM?

Thanks to generous support from the Nick Barone Scholarship Fund and the Guild coffers, this workshop is being offered for FREE to current guild members.

Participants only need to purchase the materials kit for \$80 and will also have to buy their puppet skin materials (more info when you register.)

It would be helpful if you have some basic puppet building skills, i.e. handy with cutting, gluing, HAND SEWING and ideally machine sewing, but beginners are welcome.

This workshop is limited to 12 seats. 9 slots are for workshop participants that would like to take home their Puppetathlete. These participants will be responsible for the cost of the kit and fleece. Three spaces are for those members who would like to learn great building skills, but are donating their time to build a puppet for the Guild to use for Guild activities like the Puppetathlon. These puppets will remain with the Guild and the Guild will pay for the kit.

Non-Guild members can also register for the workshop for \$350 plus materials fees. Or we encourage them to join our Guild.

We expect these 12 seats will go FAST! Signups are on a 1st come basis. Mary needs to know how many kits to prepare asap, but no later than OCT 15th. So spread the word, tell your friends and sign up today at

The info below, provided by Mary Nagler is for her workshop registrants, but is also helpful info for any puppeteer who has ever said "Where do I find "Muppet" fleece? It takes ½ yard of fabric to cover/skin a Puppetathlete. I recommend light or bright colors for the stage. Please bring your own matching thread for the fleece.

The preferred covering is Nyla fleece, available from the following suppliers: (This is how you pick the color you want!)

You can also cover your puppet in a good quality blanket fleece, that you'd find at Joanne's or most fabric stores, but "Muppet" fleece hides the seam lines beautifully.

Behind the Curtain (Meet the Guild)

Alicia M. Retes - Interpretive Artisan & Story-telling Musician
This is the beginning of an ongoing series of profiles on Guild members, old and new.



One of our newest Guild members, Alicia Retes attended our Sept. Zoom "Show & Tell". She shared her work in storytelling, introducing her cornhusk dolls that she uses to tell stories of the foods that indigenous peoples have given to the world. She mentioned that she was looking for ideas of making a cornstalk grown in front of an audience. Mary Nagler (Whorls of Wonder) and Sean and Patrick Johnson (Swazzle) both shared ideas centered around an expanding pole and the magic trick of the "growing" newspaper stalk. Swazzle illustrated their point by "growing" the arm of their Audrey II puppet.

For over 20 years Alicia has been presenting entertaining and educational programs of natural history and indigenous cultural narratives. Alicia—part Mayo and Yaqui—is a multifaceted interpretive artisan, naturalist, and story-telling musician. Originally from San Diego, her travels have taken her up and down the West Coast, Hawaii, and Australia. As the former Education Director at the Museum of the American Indian in Novato, she shares her knowledge about the Coast Miwok people and sings original trilingual songs in English, Spanish, and Coast Miwok.

Alicia is interested in bringing her stories to a larger stage. She'd like to learn more puppetry and how to build larger scale puppets/costumes. She'd like to exchange ideas and enjoys the camaraderie of working with others. Giant Puppets for ClimateJustice - Part 2

This is the second part of the tale of building Giant Puppets for ClimateJustice.

This year began my big leap and adventure into building and using puppets for Climate and Social Justice work. I am discovering there are a number of activist groups working together under this larger umbrella of activism. Puppets are, I believe, potent visual elements. They have the ability to embody physically, the narrative and character of the story or message being conveyed. It's one of the many powers of the puppet that those of us who call ourselves puppeteers are perhaps more keenly aware of. I had no idea that at the time when I joined up with an activist group called Third Act!, that I would be eventually jumping into activist work with puppets. But here I am, almost a year later doing it with and enabling others to do this work with puppets.

Through Third Act!, I became connected with three other groups of climate activists in the Sacramento area. They heard about me through a family friend also involved in this work and wanted me to come to Sacramento to do a workshop and teach them how to build their own giant puppets. This workshop ended up being pulled together very quickly since the newly formed Third Act! Folks had planned their first big national march against the four big banks who are helping to fund fossil fuel industries. The big day of action was planned for March 21, 2023. So the two

weekends prior to that date became the big busy days of the giant puppet building workshop.

Originally designed to be a single day build, it became apparent that we needed to do another weekend day in order for folks to be able to complete the creation and build of their puppets. It was quite an endeavor that was empowering for the participants and made me feel like I had added some potent, powerful, puppet energy to the cause.

Each of the four activist groups consisted of around three participants each. Two groups made their versions of Mother Earth puppets. One group did a scream puppet and another created a Greta Thunberg puppet. All of them debuted in front of the Big Banks and outside the Capitol building in Sacramento on March 23.

Giant puppets are wonderful to have as part of Climate activism because they offer the creators the opportunity to have a cast of recognizable puppet characters that can show up time and time again at actions and marches and become Avatars for the movement. They become visual memes on social media and grab noticeable attention of folks of all ages to the issues at hand.

Since their first creation, these four puppets have continued to be used, most recently at a planned action in Sacramento that took place in Old Sacramento. It consisted of a rally on the waterfront and march across the Tower Bridge and back for the final wrap up of the action. I, along with a group of around 15 activists from Sacramento, created a five plus minute puppet show with the four puppets originally created at the workshop. The story had a clothes line that stretched and was held between the two Mother Earth Puppets. A narrator (me) told a story of Greta and Scream having a conversation between the two of them about the dire consequences of climate change caused by the burning of fossil fuels.

All the while between them, five pieces of "dirty laundry" (banners) issues caused by the burning of fossil fuels, were hung on the clothesline by an Extractor character from Extinction Rebellion. Then along came the clean laundry lady who ripped down the "dirty laundry" and put up five "clean green laundry solutions" (banners) in their place. And in the end as most fairytales go, "they lived happily ever after". It was impactful and fun for all ages, ending with a positive message.

I have to say this has been some of the most meaningful, impactful, puppet work I've done so far. What is most gratifying for me, is knowing that I was able to help empower folks to unleash their personal creativity. To realize that they had the ability to make an amazing giant puppet of their own that will be available to have a visual impact for Climate Justice in the many days of action yet to come. So here's to THE POWER OF THE PUPPET!

So, I have determined that writing a play for puppets is just the same amount of work as writing a play for people. I had thought otherwise and took on the task with vigor. The responsibility was huge for I took a classic story of Don Quixote and fine-tuned it to family entertainment.

Though Don Quixote is a classic story, it was challenging to put in puppet language. The average reading time of Don Quixote is 17 hours and 52 minutes. This puppet play is less than an hour. Visuals were implemented to help the story along that is based on a novel.

Visuals? I should mention that we utilize three screens in the theater. We use the screens to thrust a story forward. We use film, and images on the screens. This could be viewed as mixed media. In reality, mixed media is common in regional theaters.

I also thought that rehearsals would be minimal since the puppeteers don't need to memorize lines. Yet, they must memorize moments and places on the stage for the puppets. This is called 'blocking.' I had to block puppets! This makes me laugh that I had to write out where the puppets must be for the lines. It's just like a play.

The puppets for Don Quixote are extremely well handcrafted and a joy to watch on stage. They were made in the Czech Republic with artistry I have never seen before. HMTC is looking forward to audience reaction to something very special for Hanford audience.

The show celebrates the season with a variety of musical acts and funny interludes with our host "Aunt Grandma" (a witch) and "Jittiers" (a bat). Each year we rotate acts and try to refurbish and bring back some of the older beloved pieces. This year we have some new puppeteers, so we scaled back a bit, but it is still a strong show that I think Larry would be proud of. I am also trying to weave back in some of the strange and wonderful idiosyncratic banter that takes it out of the realm of straight musical revue.
