Meet Our Members



Toni "Tone" Mikulka-Chang and husband "Cello Joe" Chang

There's excitement in the San Francisco puppet community and one of the people who has been making that happen is Toni Mikulka-Chang. Toni's passion for puppetry stems from her love for both athleticism and the performing arts. Whether it's the dynamic energy of her parade puppets or the intimate storytelling of hand puppets, she believes movement is key, and the puppet must always be alive.

Toni's journey into the world of theater began at the tender age of 5 in her hometown of Suffern, NY. Growing up, she displayed a natural talent not only in the performing arts but also in athletics, particularly excelling in lacrosse and other sports. After obtaining a degree in Anthropology and Art, she ventured into nonprofit development of the arts in New York City. However, it was her acceptance into the historic Bread and Puppet Theater in Vermont in 2010 that marked a pivotal career shift for Toni.

The inception of "Giant Puppets Save the World" in Seattle followed, propelled by a grant from the Fremont Art Council. Toni eventually settled in the Bay Area in 2012, where she currently resides in San Francisco with her husband Joe Chang, also known as "Cello Joe," a talented musician who often joins as her puppet partner for their hand puppet shows. Together, they explore folktales from their diverse cultural backgrounds, blending Toni's European heritage (Czech/Slovak, Italian, and Swedish) with Joey's Asian Jewish influences (Japanese, Taiwanese, Polish Jewish). Their collection boasts over 300 handcrafted puppets. They will be performing "Folktales from Around the World" featuring their original re-telling ancient stories from their heritage with a modern twist, at the Grass Valley Center for the Arts on April 20th for the Family Fun Day (see <u>link</u> for event details).

Notably, Toni employs eco-friendly construction methods in her puppetry endeavors, eschewing toxic glues in favor of safer alternatives like wood glue. Her arsenal includes zip ties, wire wrapping, and the ever-reliable needle and thread. For instance, her parade birds feature heads are made from reed with hand-dyed silk wings spanning 15', connected to a windsock beneath to create the form for the body, which is held up by three bamboo poles tied to piece of piping running the width of the bird's wings. These lightweight and collapsible creations are easily transported, making them ideal for festivals and events.

Toni designs, builds, stilt walks and has an incredible store of parade puppets and costumes to bring to festivals. Beyond entertainment, Toni utilizes her puppets as vehicles for social commentary, raising awareness about various social issues.

"I think multi-puppeteer puppets encourage teamwork, collaboration, and communication, by encouraging us to work together to create something greater than ourselves."

In her "spare time" Toni works as a marketing consultant for the pet health industry and is currently enrolled in an MBA program at UC Davis. In August, Toni will be teaching a workshop on how to make giant flying bird kites at a community art center in Grass Valley (stay tuned for details in our next newsletter!).

Principles of Puppetry Online with Pam Severns

Saturdays, April 6-27, 1-3 PM EDT


Tracing The Tangled Roots of Our "Puppet-Tree" and the San Francisco Bay Area Puppetry Guild (1954 - 2024)

Part 3 - 1960 - 1969:



Welcome back history buffs! Last time we left you with Mike Oznowicz in the restroom, and the fledgling guild in turmoil. Join the Puppeteers of America or not? Seizing the moment, after months of long debate, the group acted quickly and voted unanimously to become a chartered guild of the P. Of A. When Mike returned, he laughed heartedly, and added his vote of "Yes, finally!" to the tally. And the process began...

The Vietnam War, which started in 1956, was creating furor in the streets. And so it was only natural that "Punch and Judy" performers added their political puppet voices to the era. Puppets were everywhere! Lewis Mahlmann, who was on the P of A board, took our member's request to the national organization. Our members wanted to host a National Festival in 1961, as well as becoming an official guild. To practice for the National, our brave members decided to host the first West Coast Regional Fest in 1960, in San Francisco. Here's a "tricky history" part. The P. Of. A. approved our guild in late 1960, according to their history, but the actual charter signed by them and presented to the guild, is dated 1961. And so on February 11, 1961, our local community of puppet enthusiasts was recognized as The San Francisco Bay Area Puppeteers Guild by The Puppeteers of America. Patricia Lavin became our 1st provisional president. William Stewart Jones, Lewis Mahlmann, and Tony Urbano who were all members of the board for P. of A. paved the way for us to become recognized guild charter #7. Charter members of the guild included: Jan Ballan, Mr. & Mrs. Leonard Colton, John H. Crafts, Lettie

Connell (Schubert), Marian Derby, Dahl Delu, Ray Fenton, Clyde Forsman, Sally G. Hanson, Sydney Kittinger, Hanna W. Lavin, Mary Patricia Lavin, Roberta G. Mack, Lewis Mahlmann, Barbara Mee, Frances Oznowicz, Frank Oznowicz, Mike Oznowicz Patricia Whitehill, Talma-Zetta Wilbur, and Wolo Von Trutzchler. Acting for the Puppeteers of America were: John U. Zweers - President, Lewis Mahlmann - Vice President, Margaret Bennington - Secretary, and board members signing were Donald Coleman, Margaret Fickling, William Stewart Jones, Joseph Owens and Jean Starr Wiksell. Fun Facts: The Los Angeles Guild began meeting in 1956, and was chartered in 1957. The San Diego Guild first met in 1957, and was chartered in 1961. So we were the first guild ever meeting in the state in 1954.

And what of our 1960 Regional Festival? Festival Director Lettie Schubert assured us it was a success, great practice for the National, and adding a whopping profit of \$25.00 to the new guild treasury!

And now we'll take a moment to catch up on our now "three" major puppet theaters in the Bay Area. The Vagabond Puppets were once again going to change directorship. Lettie Schubert was leaving the Oakland Dept. to work on the upcoming puppet festivals, and begin to raise a family. In 1961 Jerry Juhl (1956 - 2005) and Frank, or "Frankie" Oznowicz (1956 - present) as the newspapers referred to him, joined as a team for the next year. This teaming was going to change the face of puppet history. Both young men were about to embark on a great adventure. For the upcoming 1961 National Festival, Lettie asked them to perform their current Vagabond show "The Witch Who Stole Tuesday" for the puppeteers. And it so happened that Jim Henson was in the audience scouting talent for his new Muppet Company. He immediately hired both of them. Jerry, who had finished his education, moved to New York after Vagabond closed for the Summer. Jerry became the head writer for most Muppet projects, including "The Muppet Show," "Fraggle Rock," feature film and television productions, and of course the first years of "Sesame Street." Frank had to stay home for a year and finish High School. The next year, after he closed the Vagabond puppet program, he joined Jim and Jerry and the rest is history! From 1963 - 65, the name of the Vagabond director is lost to time. But Ruth Sicular, who was a puppeteer and prominent mime with the San Francisco Mime Troupe, ran the program from 1966 - 67. And from 1968 - 69, there is no mention of who directed the puppet program in Oakland. Also of note working for the Vagabond program is Sally Hanson-Ferreira and future Oakland district attorney Don Ingraham, who both wrote puppet plays, puppeteered and taught youth puppet classes for the Oakland Rec. Dept. and Children's Fairyland. All of these youthful puppeteers, plus John Gilkerson, were the next generation of Bay Area puppet professionals.



And over at Fairyland, near Lake Merritt, Tony Urbano was the 2nd Storybook Puppet Theater director from 1959 - 1962. And then after five successful years at the Park, Tony moved to Los Angeles and began his own career where he would work with The Yale Puppeteers, Bil Baird in New York, and design for Sid and Marty Krofft productions. He also ran successful seasonal marionette shows at Universal Studios and the Laguna Beach Festival of Art. Oh...and he also helped co-create the SAG Puppeteers Union for the film industry. I should also mention one other thing about Tony. Before Frank Oz joined Vagabond, Tony was Frank's mentor in puppetry, where he was learning the trade at Fairyland. Now I mentioned that there was a third puppet theater forming in our area. In 1961, based on the success of Fairyland's theater, Happy Hollow Park and Zoo opened The Castle Puppet Theater.

The first director was going to be Jerry Juhl, who had a popular puppet program "Sylvie and Pup" on television in San Jose. But when he heard they only wanted marionettes performed at the theater, he decided to run Vagabond. Wise career choice. And so, although not the director, Happy Hollow hired 18 year old Luman Coad to help manage the park's puppet program under Theater Director Ron Skolman.





Dissatisfied with the treatment at Happy Hollow, Luman moved to Oakland and became the 3rd and youngest puppet theater director at age 20. Luman Coad (1961- present) was the Storybook Theater director from 1963 - 1966. One of his Fairyland productions was even presented at an International Puppet Festival in Romania, and "A Dog's Tale" won first prize. The park payed for him to be able to represent Oakland at this event. When it became apparent that the United States draft board was not going to grant him a conscientious objector classification for the Vietnam War, Luman decided that he would move to Canada where he married his partner Arlyn Coad and the two formed the internationally known company of Coad Canada Puppets. Luman and Arlyn are Pioneer Members of the British Columbia Entertainment Hall of Fame and created Charlemagne Press, a book company that publishes and sells high quality books on the art of puppetry. (www.charlemagnepress.com) In 1967, Lewis Mahlmann will become the 4th Storybook Puppet Director and for the next 39 years, he and his life partner David C. Jones, a writer and school teacher will present shows based on fairy tales, world tales and theatrical ballets and literature.





During his tenure, Lewis will mentor his first apprentice John Gilkerson (1964—1989). Although taken from us too early, John would have an impressive career in the Bay Area. Not only an active member in the beginning of the guild, John designed costumes and sets for several prominent ballet companies, worked with Frank Zappa on a Puppet-musical event, built miniature mechanical puppet windows for stores in downtown San Francisco, designed Fairyland events and shows, and built the puppets and starred in "Buster and Me" with guild member Robin Goodrow. A high school best friend of Tom Hanks, Hanks would honor John at the 1994 Academy Awards when he credited John for inspiring his performance of a gay man in a positive way in the film "Philadelphia."

As you can see, our young guild had many amazing talents supporting puppetry. And before I close I'd like to share a few more of our amazing talented members.

Benjamin Blake (1950 - early 70s), a talented painter, sculptor and teacher, moved his company from Boston and took the puppet community by storm with his beautiful puppets. His 1962 television special of Benjamin Britton's "The Little Sweep", narrated by Ray Bolger, used guild talents Marian Derby, Lewis Mahlmann and Luman Coad.

Richard Bay (1966 - present), who taught the puppet arts at Cal State Sacramento for 29 years, was performing at Fairytale Town in Sacramento and bringing puppet operas to elementary schools. Elisheva "Betty" Hart (1950 - present) appeared on the Bay Area scene using puppetry to entertain with storytelling and her speciality: shadow puppetry.


The Berkeley Puppeteers (1957 - 2015), Bill Cassady and Helga Williamson, were presenting world cultural tales and in 1965 on KQED Channel 9 spellbound us with an allegorical puppet tale about a web of illusion titled "The Net." In San Francisco a trio of talented couples, John & Lorraine Crafts, John & Barbara Mee and Peter & Charlotte Black, guild charter

members, were producing high quality theatrical marionette productions in their basement under the heading of The High-Strung Theater (1950 - 1970).

Jack & Elva Aiken or the Aiken Puppets (Mid-50s to present) were traveling long distances to attend meetings while Jack was using his cinematography skills to document our expanding puppet community. Keeping us laughing was Steve Hansen (1968 - 2011), who just graduated from San Francisco State and was performing on the streets at Fisherman's Wharf with his political "Punch & Judy."

And of course our Los Angeles member Alan Cook (1940 - 2019), was very busy connecting the puppeteers while chronicling their varied puppet talents. Alan is responsible for the creation of the International Puppetry Museum which showcases the puppets of many of our guild members.

In conclusion, the 1961 National puppet convention was a rousing success, and well worth the effort of becoming a unified guild of the Puppeteers of America. Our guild shined a bright light on the quality puppetry that we were doing on the West Coast. I have been lucky enough to have been a youth member and talked with most of these early practitioners of the art over the years. Our written history is very rare since early newsletters haven't always survived. Our guild letters were saved in earnest roughly around 1971. These first 20 years have survived mostly through personal interviews, Children's Fairyland archives and the rare newspaper clippings. In the next months, I'll begin to highlight more members and activities as they were written about in our newsletters. So... keep looking for your names! See you in the 70s.
