Kennedy Puppets participated in the festival on August 2nd, setting up in the main lobby. While we were scheduled to officially start around 10:00 AM, there was some confusion with people suggesting different start times, such as 9:30 or 9:00 AM. Despite the mix-up, we were happy to accommodate the early arrivals who were eager to create puppets.

As we set up, our focus was on providing a fun and engaging experience for the children. We brought our tabletop theater, allowing kids to learn how to operate their new puppet friends and showcase their creations. The Puppet Theater was a hit, giving children a chance to demonstrate their newfound skills and put on shows for their families and friends.

We offered a wide variety of puppets, including finger puppets, basic hand puppets, specialized hand puppets for children with special needs, oven mitt-style open-mouth puppets, and character-type puppets. On that day, we prepared a total of 364 puppets. Out of these, 62 were completed and found new homes with enthusiastic young puppeteers.

It was a joy to see the finished puppets and witness the imaginative shows the children performed. We hope our new puppeteers have many fun and creative moments with their puppet friends, and we look forward to seeing the unique shows and props they develop. Educating Educators


I had the privilege of leading an Educators Workshop on Friday, August 2nd at the Northern

California Puppet Festival. I had a hard time narrowing down what I would like to cover in my workshop. Though I had plenty of ideas, I quickly realized some would be easier to transport than others. I settled on sharing the apron puppet show of the plants and animals of Northern California that I had created with my Spark Homeschool Enrichment class. I decided that for the workshop I would simply perform the show and then lead educators through the steps I took to create it with the kids and finish by having them craft one of the paper puppets in the show. I was especially excited for this part as I wanted to share the paper puppets and the Pop Lock building system by Paper Poseables. (http://www.paperposeables.com) The first morning of the festival was a whirlwind of activity, with everyone bustling to get set up, signed in, and into the right rooms. Despite the chaos, there was an undeniable excitement in the air, and the whole community center was buzzing with energy.

When the time finally arrived for me to do my presentation, I nervously fought back imposter syndrome and reminded myself that this was a group of people with whom I already have a lot in common. I didn't have to try to convince them of the merits and benefits of using puppetry to teach. Many of them have been doing it for years. I should be learning from them! But right now I would be sharing ideas with like minded folks. I took a deep breath and jumped into my presentation.

Despite some bumps (what was the next line of the poem? My owl puppet isn't working like it's supposed to! Oh boy, I forgot to bring in the scissors, how will they make the craft?), the workshop was fun and the participants were all so kind. It was a rewarding experience that reminded me of the power of creativity and community in education. The festivals are where it is happening!

August was a blur of activity - between our guild's festival and The Midwest regional Puppetry Palate which was held in Minneapolis.

There is something about the festivals in the Midwest. I have always come away feeling like I have reconnected with (and added to) family.

The workshops were brilliant and varied. The problem is that I want to go to all of them. Workshops included: Puppets in Education, a short course on marionettes by Kurt Hunter, making a personal memoir show by Monica Leo, sand drawings and shadows, rod puppets, foam puppets, integrating puppets, and live actors, presenting memoirs through puppet performance, play development and sound. I presented a workshop on making masks and costumes from oversized paper bags. I learned a valuable lesson about being able to buy common (heavy)materials when I arrived at the festival destination.



Many of the performances were held in a lovely old theater filled with masks and oversized puppets. called "The Heart of The Beast"

There was a common theme running throughout many of the performances. The theme of victims of violence, war and poverty forcing people from their homes and the experience of dealing with the refugee troubles when refugees come up against the devastating American governmental policies.

"Phantomloss," a tragedy/comedy weaves Vietnamese mythology, and American pop culture into a tale of the trauma and healing experienced by a young woman whose family was torn apart when trying to escape post-war Vietnam.

One of the most powerful pieces was "Migrations/Migraciones" by Paradox Teatro Explored the global migration situation and global refugee crisis when it comes up against American border policies.

"Monkey Bears Harmolodic Workshops Showcase" included pieces from five graduates of the workshop program created to support Indigenous, American, black, and underserved communities in developing creative and technical skills in contemporary puppetry.

There was also a wonderful variety of family friendly shows, including: Punch & Judy by Parasol Puppets,

"The Amazing Gnip Gnop Circus" (a glow in the dark ping-pong circus spectacular,) "Uncle Rabbits Adventures" by Eulenspiegel Puppet Theater, The Fisherman and his Wife" by Pam Corcoran and "New Squid on the Block."

The Saturday night slam ran the gamut. One of my favorites was a hilarious father-daughter performance of a couple of well-educated head lice versus a comb to some very thought-provoking pieces. I presented my "The Storyteller of Koshebe". I was able to video-call Sukem, the real life boy in the story who is currently staying in Awka, Nigeria. I turned the phone around and introduced Sukem to the audience who gave him a resounding ovation. My eyes still fill with tears remembering it. So now I am home again, filled with wonderful memories and new ideas for shows. If you have not yet ventured out of our area to attend a festival in another region, put it on your list of "Must do soon" activities. The relationships I have made at festivals are treasured friendships that I will carry with me all my life. And next year!....Drumroll.....! The National Festival!!! See you there!

WORKSHOPS

Toy Theater I: A Miniature Universe (Level 1) with Blair Thomas

September 30 – October 6, 2024

1 week: Mon, Tues, Thurs, Sat, and Sun

6 – 8pm CDT

Cost: \$250

A Miniature Universe: Intro to Toy Theater (Level 1) introduces the technique of conceiving, designing, building and performing a Toy Theater show using found text or original text. Fabrication and Performance experience helpful but not necessary. Participants will complete a short Toy Theater show.

Shadow Puppetry I (Level 1) with Chinese Theatre Works

October 28 – November 3, 2024

1 week: Mon, Tues, Thurs, Sat, and Sun

7 – 9pm CDT Cost: \$250

Shadow Puppetry 1 (Level 1) is an introduction to the form for the beginning puppeteer. Students will create a desktop shadow theater, build and create basic shadow figures and environments and devise their own short pieces with music or text. An overview of world shadow puppetry traditions is included as well as an introduction to light sources and fabrication. The course makes use of basic materials including home recyclables.

Literature of World Puppetry (Level 1) with Dr. Paulette Richards

October 1 – December 3, 2024

(no class on Election Day, 11/5, and the week of Thanksgiving, 11/26)

8 sessions over 8 weeks:

Tuesdays: 6:30 - 8pm CDT

Cost: \$300

Why do puppets excel at telling the world's most beloved stories? Puppets can fly. Puppets can swim. They can be enormous or tiny. They can bring animal, mineral, or vegetable as well as human characters to life. This introduction to puppet dramaturgy will explore the enduring magic of staging the world's literary masterpieces with puppets. Provided texts include The Ramayana, Punch and Judy, The Love Suicides at Amijima, Anansi stories, and more. Chicago Puppet Fest Symposium curator and author of Object Performance in the Black Atlantic, Dr. Paulette Richards, teaches this seminar.

Cardboard Sculpting with Tarish "Jeghetto" Pipkins

October 8 – 24, 2024

6 sessions over 3 weeks:

Tuesdays and Thursdays: 7 – 9pm CDT

Cost: \$300

In Cardboard Sculpting (Level 1) you will learn to sculpt and build a puppet out of cardboard with master puppeteer and builder Tarish "Jeghetto" Pipkins. Jeghetto's unique style integrates functional puppet armatures and controls with a variety of found materials. Think outside the cardboard box by creating a rod puppet with it. Jeghetto will share his unique building techniques as well as manipulating your creation.

October 9 - 23, 2024

5 sessions over 3 weeks: Wednesday 10/9; Thursday 10/10; Wednesday 10/16; Thursday 10/17;

6 – 8pm CDT

Toy Theater II (Level 2) will be an opportunity for participants to further develop their shows. We will be exploring different ways of articulating and mounting puppets and of enhancing the illusion of depth through stage design and lighting. We will also look at the dramaturgy of the miniature spectacle and isolate the compositional elements of this highly visual theater form as participants prepare for an informal —yet always exciting—showing on the last day.

To help you save time and your wrists, Digital to Physical: Computers and Cutting Machines for Puppets (Level 1) aims to share digital tools that can help elevate your next puppet project! We will learn how to digitize puppet designs into programs like Photoshop and Illustrator so that physical parts can be made using a craft cutting machine or laser cutter. Most importantly, we will learn ways to retain the human touch in our designs when digitizing them. These techniques are useful in creating shadow puppets and also limbs that can be assembled into a 3D puppet. Prior experience with this software is not necessary.
