
The set is a toy theatre writ wonderfully large with a proscenium that looks like it could have been printed and unfolded to set up, and flat set pieces that the actors move to create scenes. The colors of the sets and costumes are brilliant and vibrant And there is a puppet, a dragon. I am a fan of Ms. Zimmerman and she often uses puppetry and puppet-like effects in her plays. The puppet in this one, however, was a bit of a cameo and could have been more featured and effective (from my puppeteer point of view.) Nonetheless, hats off once again to Zimmerman for mixing puppetry and actors in her work.
