C E Choy "Beth"

Beth Choy is a retired drama director who dedicated 20 years to building an award-winning high school theater program in the city of Fairfield. Her exceptional leadership earned her seven ARTYS and over 37 nominations. During the last 11 years of her tenure, Beth combined her passion for education and artistry as a self-taught puppet builder, teaching students to craft their own creations. These unique puppets were featured in shows for visiting classes, specialized shows for Special Ed classes, and primary schools, and then donated to special needs programs both within and beyond the district. Her innovative approach to puppetry in education gained recognition in California Educator's Magazine and local newspapers. Now retired, Beth focuses on selling professional puppets through her company, Bok Choy's Puppets, founded in 2019.

Since 2021, Beth has been an active member of SFBAPG, contributing in areas Membership and Secretary, and serving as Vice President. She values her time with the guild and is eager to continue supporting its programs. Beth's legacy lies in her creativity, dedication, and advocacy for inclusive arts education.



David Garden Jr. has worked in the film, theater, and art world for the past 25 years. He works in a variety of mediums and is a strong advocate of utilizing the materials strewn about our planet ... repurposing them into art pieces. His award winning short films have been exhibited throughout the U.S.. and Europe. He was an art instructor at Nimbus Arts for many years and is the executive director at White Barn Performing Arts venue. He produced the first Napa Valley Puppetry Festival last year.



Heather Gobbée is Sonoma County Arts Educator of the Year and presently teaches Visual & Performing Arts at Adele Harrison Middle School, Art & Yoga Therapy for neurodivergent adults with De Colores Arts, and directs with Backyard Kids Theater in Sonoma. Heather is a professional actor (AEA), Certified Yoga Therapist (C-IAYT) and Movement Educator with an MFA in Acting from Brandeis University and CA Teacher Certification in Theater Arts, PreK-12. Heather has performed and taught drama, improvisation, puppetry, yoga and creative movement for children and adults across NYC and CA. Heather is an excited

and active SFBAPG member, workshop committee coordinator, taught two workshops, a puppet build and performed in the Puppetathloon for the SFBAPG 70th Anniversary Northern CA Puppetry Festival. Last year Heather built giant lighted puppets with Andrew Kim, Animal Cracker Conspiracy and Donovan Zimmerman and taught "Under the Sea, Cardboard & Me!" a Reuse, Rebuild, Reimagine Junk Puppet workshop for National Endowment of the Arts Recipient Open Source Gallery's KoKo NYC family program.

A Magical Week of Creativity: Paperhand Puppet Project Workshop with Woander

At the beginning of April, artists of all ages descended on Mill Valley's O'Hanlon Center for the Arts for a week-long mask-building and giant puppet workshop led by Donovan Zimmerman of the acclaimed Paperhand Puppet Project.



Known for their breathtaking storytelling through towering puppets, handmade masks, and shadow theater, Paperhand strives to share the art of puppetry, which Donovan described as "the people's art form," as a means to foster resilient networks of connection between each other as humans, along with the Earth, and to promote peace and justice.

The workshop was dreamed up and hosted by SFBAPG member Matthew Purdon, who wished to create giant puppets for Wylding Woods, an interactive experience for children offered by his new family play store, Woander in Mill Valley.

Participants gathered each morning to learn the Paperhand method of building with papier-mâché, cardboard, and clay, gathering a few tricks of the craft developed by Zimmerman and co-founder Jan Burger at their Saxapahaw, North Carolina studio. The workshop culminated with the creation of stunning masks and large-scale puppets that echoed mythic archetypes, nature spirits, and whimsical woodland creatures, true to both Paperhand Puppets' and Woander's creative ethos.

One workshop attendee described the experience as a "wonderful week full of inspiration," noting the communal atmosphere of shared purpose and hands-on making. Another related that she "went

in pretty open-minded and learned that I really enjoy puppetry."

Joining in the workshop were several of SFBAPG's members, including Lee Armstrong (who worked to sew the body of the giant puppets out of large swaths of fabric), along with Fred C Riley III, Lisa Zagone, Dahlia Yarbrough, and Brie PetrucciYarbrough. Member Heather Gobbée joined the group for Donovan's show-and-tell presentation and talk, which was well-attended by Mill Valley community members on Wednesday evening. Guild participants left inspired to bring more giant creations to life, and excited to share learnings with fellow members at futuremeetings and workshops!

The week concluded with a celebratory puppet parade through Mill Valley's Friday Farmer's Market, with drumming, dancing, and the group's colorful creatures weaving through the booths. Making his debut in the parade was Drak, a powerful Stone Wizard who floated ceremoniously behind a majestic Giant White Egret, which led the playful troupe. Masked creatures included owls, a fruit bat, fox, an African wild dog, along with a couple of whimsical and bejeweled characters.



The joyful procession brought smiles and rave reviews from Farmer's Market vendors, reminding everyone of the power of art to uplift our communities and awaken wonder.

Woander will be hosting future workshops that continue to root creativity in community by encouraging families and kids to get involved in the magic of mask and puppet building. Stay tuned!

Heather Gobbée is Sonoma County's Creative Educator of 2025

Heather Gobbée is the deserving recipient of the Creative Educator of the Year award given by Creative Sonoma at the Luther Burbank Center in Santa Rosa. "The Arts Educator of the Year Award honors professional arts educators working with the K-12 population," a press release announcing Gobbée's award said. "It recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to the advancement of arts education over an extended period."

Heather is currently teaching visual arts to Adele Harris Middle School in onoma.

Recently she guided over 60 students as they created their own "muppet-style" puppets. She then directed them in the school talent show, where the puppets performed a show-stopping "NUEVAyol" by Bad Bunny with great success. When a student at the school was asked what he liked best in the talent show, he said "The puppet show. It had a puppet DJ and everything!" They have been invited to repeat their performance at Sonoma High School.

She has served as a director and associate director at Backyard Kids Theatre and taught adults with neuro divergences at De Colores Arts, a Sonoma-based community arts center. Heather is a very active member of our Guild, where she played a major role in bringing the N. CA Puppet Festival to Sonoma last year, and also taught a workshop on puppet improv and another on tabletop puppetry.

Below is an excerpt from the presentation tribute...

"This year's honoree brings over 20 years of experience as an educator and has made her mark across disciplines-drama, puppetry, yoga and visual arts-while always centering creativity, inclusion and connection.

Heather has worked in public schools, private preschools and arts organizations, often designing programs from the ground up. She leads with compassion, especially in her work with neurodivergent students, creating welcoming spaces where every child feels seen, heard and empowered to express themselves.

Woander Opens Its Doors to Magic and Imagination in Mill Valley





Nestled in a charming storefront at 73 Throckmorton Avenue in Mill Valley, Woander celebrated its Grand Opening on Saturday, March 19. Visitors were welcomed by an enchanting mix of puppets—both large and small—alongside puppet-making activities, a magician, and of course, the new store itself.

The brainchild of Guild member Matthew Purdon, Woander is designed as a community hub where families and children can come together to explore games, attend creative workshops, and immerse themselves in magical experiences inspired by the Wylding Woods. Woander also features a wide variety of Folkmanis puppets.

Opening day featured a cast of extraordinary puppet characters. Barnaby, a lively green troll who played hopscotch and chatted with children, was created by Eric Wright of Puppet Kitchen in New York. A playful chipmunk and a soaring hawk, crafted by Hobey Ford of North Carolina, delighted the crowd. Agnor the dragon made a transatlantic journey from England, while Moss the caterpillar was built by talented Guild member Lisa Zagone.

More giant puppet characters will be unveiled in future chapters of the Wylding Woods adventures and during the upcoming Mill Valley Music Festival on May 10–11.

Congratulations to Matthew Purdon and his team for creating a welcoming home for imagination, storytelling, and community connection.







Fairyland @ 75: A Legacy of Magic





Fairyland's rich history is highlighted this spring at the Oakland Museum of California (OMCA) in an installation titled Fairyland @ 75: A Legacy of Magic invites visitors to learn more about Fairyland's history, evolution, and enduring magic.

The collaborative installation includes a timeline of Fairyland's journey, a "then and now" look at its beloved park attractions, and a glimpse into the park's bright future. Visitors will discover miniatures created by local artists, photos of Magic Keys through the decades, and even one of Fairyland's original Jolly Trolly cars for kids and families to climb aboard. This feature celebrates Fairyland's lasting legacy and role in shaping Oakland's cultural landscape.

Kymberly Miller Ex. Director of Children's Fairyland planned the exhibit with Lori Fogarty, Ex. Director at the Oakland Museum. Longtime puppet theater director Randal Metz and Shannon Taylor, the director of art and restoration at the park put the exhibit together. Both Metz and Taylor have deep roots in Fairyland. Metz joined the park 55 years ago and has held various jobs since. Taylor has worked at the park for 15 years, volunteered before, and visited the park as a kid. One of the items in Metz's collection on display is his "Fairyland lifetime pass," which he received when he was 11.



This visually-stunning book is a lookback on Paperhand Puppet Intervention's two decades of giant puppet pageantry, community-building and genre-defying art. Co-creative founders/directors Donovan Zimmerman and Jan Berger share memories of the genesis of Paperhand and its 23 completely original and enchanting puppet pageants, plus interventions, parades and glimpses behind-the-scenes, revealing how they deftly weave together the strands of art and environmental activism into "artivism" that inspires audiences to revere and protect the natural world.

It's a deep dive into the myth, the ethos and beauty behind their craft and is a giant love letter to the Paperhand community of ingenious dreamers, makers, musicians and puppeteers.
