Explore 2 Workshops "Puppet Building & Performance" & "TV Puppetry" this Fall

Images in Motion, Sonoma's award-winning television puppetry production company, is sharing the art of puppetry with two hands-on workshops this fall.

The first, "Explore Puppet Building & Performance," will take place at the Sonoma Community Center on Sunday, October 5. The second, a TV Puppet workshop, will be held at the fully equipped Images in Motion Studio in Sonoma on Saturday, November 8. Participants may register for either session individually or attend both for a complete puppetry experience. Both workshops will be led by Lee Armstrong, regional Emmy® Awardwinning puppeteer and co-owner of Images in Motion.

Both workshops are open to teens and adults, and are especially relevant for puppeteers, actors, teachers, librarians, youth leaders, and parents who are seeking creative tools for education and storytelling.

Participants of the October workshop will build a mouth/rod (Muppet-style) puppet from a kit which includes quality materials – presewn head/body, arms, hands, arms, flexible mouth, eyes, feathers, fur and more! Please preorder your kit by Wednesday, October 1st. The second part of the day will be character development and cover manipulation fundamentals to bring your puppet to life. This TV workshop is recommended for those with some prior puppetry experience, as we will build on this to develop skills in front of the camera. Or attend the Oct. 5 Build a Puppet & Performance workshop.

Lee Armstrong is endlessly fascinated by the movement of inanimate objects—especially when they come to life through puppetry and video. She's a co-founder and Producer at Images in Motion Inc. in Sonoma, where she's helped bring stories to life for clients like the USDA Forest Service, LeapFrog, PBS, and more. Her puppeteering credits include three seasons on Jim Henson's Emmy-winning Fraggle Rock, Being John Malkovich, Moneybone, and a range of PBS shows and commercials. Lee's work has earned her two regional Emmys, and TV/film productions she has contributed to have been recognized by ten national Telly Awards, National Ad Council, KidsFirst, and more. She's also shared her passion through teaching—lecturing for years at UCSC on Jim Henson's legacy, and leading workshops on puppetry nationwide.

Puppets In The House

I just got back from a wonderful regional festival in Wisconsin. Puppets In The House was sponsored by the Great Plains Region. Laurie Everitt and Brant Bollman directed the event. It had a fantastic variety of shows and workshops. I have tried to cover as much as I could. The performances represented a fantastic variety of styles ranging from hilarious to heartbreakingly tragic. Our own Art Gruenberger performed "Three Billygoats Gruff," a hilarious fast paced mash-up of Well loved fairytales. Madison J Cripps performed his "A Slice Of Crazy Pie" it was a frenetic, one man Vaudeville show with music, audience participation, and multi instrument performance verging

on fun insanity. Matthew McGee performed a show called "Pip and Squeak Go To The Show" about two lovable comical mice (based on characters created originally by Rob D'Arc) looking for a show which turns out to be their show. Puppet Kebab presented "The Snowflake Man" based on the true story of Wilson Bentley, who became the first person to photograph a single snowflake crystal. Miss Pussycat and Quintron presented ""MG Xing Ever Gras", a table top Puppet show about two kittens getting ready for Mardi Gras. The sweetness of the simple puppets made from recycled materials and the brilliant, high energy and rather goofy performance style made this a really fun show.

"A La Carte: in a Fool's Kitchen" by Z puppets Rosenschnoz and Gabriella sweet was a comic battle between a clown friend chef and a Wiley lobster set to live accordion music. Liz Howls presented "Happy Accident" A nightmare, exploration of bizarre and often tacky American culture, and absurdity. Parasol Puppets presented a traditional and yet contemporary Punch and Judy show. Peter Allen gave a hilarious, traditional, and yet totally relatable Punch and Judy show for the Puppets in the Park community event on Saturday, which was open to the public. "Learning To Fly" by One Double O Four Eight was one of the most powerful pieces of theater I have seen at a festival. It is a 2 person show set in one of the twin towers on 9/11. It chronicles the fictional story of 2 people caught in the second tower in real time as the attack unfolds.

On Friday night there was a curated slam. Honestly, I was behind the stage and missed most of it but what I saw was terrific. Saturday night started to wrap up the festival with Pot Pourri, emceed by Kurt Hunter It was a wide variety of shows with some high spots and a few touching moments.







The Workshops

As always happens, you have to make choices, particularly for workshops. Puppets in the House assembled a really great variety of workshops. I heard nothing but raves about the workshops I didn't attend. I will cover the workshops I attended.

The first workshop that I went to was Matthew McGee's "The Wonder of Cotton Sculpting. Matt has been using a process for sculpting heads that's fast, really cheap and child friendly (no fumes, yay!!) His method

uses aluminum foil, masking, tape, white glue, and water. Briefly, it involves making a rough shape from crumpled foil, which you can cover with masking tape or not. Then white glue, thinned a little with water is brushed onto the surface. You unroll the cotton balls.(I hadn't realized that they were rolled up, but they are.) and wrap the strip of cotton around your areas of wet glue. Then you take a brush with more glue and saturate the cotton. You can build up as many layers as you wish and you don't have to let it dry in between unlike papier-mâché. After it has set for a few minutes, you can then use your fingers to mold the surface or continue using a brush and or sculpting tools. It is super hard and durable. I'm really excited to see what I can do with it.







The second workshop I took was "Manipulate Me: ensemble puppetry with Aretta." It was basically a table top Puppet workshop with the simplest table top puppets imaginable. She took strips of fabric and tied knots at the joints. Three people worked with one puppet and she went through some basic manipulation techniques. If you've got boxes full of fabric that you'll never use, or old sheets or clothes, they would be perfect for making these puppets. Sometimes I want to follow Aretta around like a puppy and soak up everything she does. She is such a knowledgeable and generous teacher, who seems to have boundless energy and patience.

The final workshop I took was a two-part workshop from Madison Crips "An Exploration in Marionettes." This was another brilliant workshop. If you've seen, Madison shows the pacing can get frenetic, and Madison appears to be on the edge of sanity. However when you take a workshop from him, you get to see the patient and skillful teacher that is the other side of Madison. He taught a workshop that truly uses my favorite technology, a stick tied to a stone. In his workshop, he provided a simple controller, which was a stick with notches cut on one end, a hole in the center and a hole on the other end. He had participants choose a big piece and a little piece of wood. They were odd shapes of wood left over from other projects, and he had

drilled several holes in each of them. Madison showed us a brilliant method of permanently attaching the strings using glue and a toothpick. We attached the two pieces of wood to each other with a short string and each of the pieces to the controller. Then we played with learning the movement that the pieces naturally wanted to do. We explored our own puppets and then worked in pairs to interact. I felt like I learned so much while having a terrific amount of fun.

All in all it was one of the most enjoyable and informative festivals I have attended. One last word. Go to the festivals! That is where it is happening. It doesn't matter if you don't know anyone. By the time you leave, you will have friendships that you will continue to build on for a lifetime.
