Fairyland's 75th: A Festival of Puppets Brie Yarbrough

Families gathered for a joyful weekend of stories, laughter, and imagination at Children's Fairyland on August 23rd and 24th. Our guild is proud to be part of Fairyland's legacy and this milestone 75th anniversary celebration! From

timeless fairy tales to inventive new performances, we're thrilled to carry on the tradition of enchanting families through the magic of puppetry at one of Oakland's most cherished landmarks.

This year's festivities featured a craft table where kids fashioned their own colorfully decorated bird and fish puppets from paper and wooden skewers. On display were two sample mini puppet theaters, which Wing Shum created from recycled materials. It was fantastic to see young budding puppetry enthusiasts engage with their creations in these little theaters, and to spot them swimming and flying their way throughout the park all weekend!

Visitors to the green in front of Emerald City Stage were treated to a display of puppets from Fairyland's storied history. Also joining the fun was park mascot Quercus, brought to life by Puppet Theater Manager and SFBAPG member Maria Rodriguez. Throughout the weekend, she hosted lively puppet meet-and-greets where children could choose a puppet from the pile and try their hand at performing.



Guild members had a blast putting their improv skills to use during walk-around shifts, reporting many curious kids asking if their puppet characters were "real." An adorable testament to the talents of our members, who bring their characters to life!

On hand for puppet performances were Kevin Menegus of Fratello Marionettes ("Vaudeville Follies"), Valerie and Michael Nelson of Magical Moonshine Theatre ("Three Little Pigs"), Art Grueneberger of Puppet Art Theater Co. ("3 Billy Goats Gruff"), and Rhonda Godwin, "The Puppet Lady." ("Mrs.Wintergreen's Birthday Surprise")

Alex Evans, Head Puppeteer of Bob Baker Marionettes, traveled from Los Angeles for two showcase performances in the Aesop Theatre, which featured historic puppets, including a roller skating Rabbit, which first entertained audiences when Disneyland first opened in 1955.







The November workshop will shift from stage to the screen, focusing on TV puppetry, where the "stage" is replaced by the camera frame. Recommended for those with some prior puppetry experience—or who attend the October session—this workshop is designed for performers looking to create engaging video content, enhance social media, and explore puppets as powerful, inclusive spokes characters.

This 5 hour class covers: Use of Monitors, Eye Focus, Breath, Mouth Synchronization, Walks, Armrods, Angles, Sharing Space, Action/Reaction, etc.. The class will also cover some of the important technical aspects, tips and tricks that make for a professional production. Lots of fun, hands-on experience!

This TV workshop is recommended for those with some prior puppetry experience, as we will build on this to develop skills in front of the camera. Or attend the Oct. 5 Build a Puppet & Performance workshop. Please bring a puppet you would like to work with, or puppets will be provided. If you built a puppet in the Oct workshop, that would be perfect! Please bring a bag lunch.

Lee Armstrong is a co-founder and Producer at Images in Motion Inc. in Sonoma, where she's helped bring stories to life for clients like the USDA Forest Service, LeapFrog, PBS, and more. Her puppeteering credits include three seasons on Jim Henson's Emmy-winning *Fraggle Rock*, *Being John Malkovich*, *Moneybone*, and a range of PBS shows and commercials. Lee's work has earned her two regional Emmys, and TV/film productions she has contributed to have been recognized by ten national Telly Awards, National Ad Council, KidsFirst, and more. She's also shared her passion through teaching—lecturing for years at UCSC on Jim Henson's legacy, and leading workshops on puppetry nationwide.

A Spellbinding New Musical Reimagines Rumpelstilzchen for Adults and Kids Alike

NEVADA COUNTY, CA —This fall, Swazzle and Angie Holm of Heady Lore Productions present *Rumpelstilzchen's Fairy Gold*, an original musical play by local puppeteer, playwright and composer **Dalrymple MacAlpin**, premiering in Nevada County at the Nevada Theatre for only four shows October 23rd-26th.

Dalrymple (pronounced Dal - rimple) has been creating works steeped in the culturally rich heritage of mythology, folklore, faerie tales and the mystical traditions surrounding them for over two decades.

Now MacAlpin brings an enchanting new production to the stage and invites audiences of all ages into the forgotten origins of one of the Brothers Grimm's most enigmatic characters — and flips the fairytale on its

The production features **11original songs** performed live by MacAlpin (piano, harp, vocals), with **Jiamo Chen** (cello) and **Jesse Krautkramer** (saxophone, vibraphone). The cast includes a talented ensemble of actors, singers, and puppeteers —**Raven Aletheia**, **Audrey Delgado**, **Jori Phillips and Vicki Colombo**—who bring to life a vibrant array of characters and handcrafted puppets, designed by MacAlpin himself after studying with Czech puppet master **Miroslav Trejtnar** of Puppets in Prague.

Big changes coming to the National Festival!

I was privileged to attend the Midwest regional festival this summer. At their regional meeting, Liz Joyce, then president of puppeteers of America was there and she addressed the meeting about changes that will be happening with the national festivals. The last national festival was held at the University of Maryland. They did an amazing festival, but it was costly and P of A lost a lot of money. The next national festival is planned for 2027 and they are looking at a new model. Traditionally, national festivals have been held at universities, but there are several reasons they want to get away from the university settings. Universities are looking to make a profit and they can be rather impersonal.


So, P of A is looking for a permanent home for national festivals. They want to find a location that has a strong arts community, good venues for workshops and performances and good options for housing. They would like to form a partnership with local arts communities and open up performances to the public.

Three possible locations are being considered for the national Festival.

1. **Verona, Wisconsin**, the site of this year's Great Plains regional festival is one possibility. It is a lovely town. They have a strong arts community, good performing and workshop venues, and reasonable hotels within walking distance. The Great Plains regional festival was a great success.

- **2. West Liberty, Iowa.** West Liberty is the home of Eulenspiegel puppets. Some advantages to West Liberty would be that they already have a strong relationship with the community. Monica Leo has put on many successful festivals over the years. The drawbacks include: it's not very close to a major airport, no good hotels in the town. At this summer's festival people traveled 20 minutes from a nearby town that had better hotels. There are some theater venues, but outdoor performances in the summer can get very hot. At the children's festival last week temperatures rose to over 100°. There are not a lot of options for large indoor air conditioned venues.
- 3. Lawrence, Kansas Lawrence Kansas is a university town, close to Kansas City airport. They have a strong arts community that would want to partner with us. We have been told they have good hotels. A possible drawback to Lawrence, Kansas is that we do not already have a network of people there, unlike the other two venues.

At this point, it looks like they are planning to hold the next national festival in Lawrence Kansas, but things could change. Although nothing definite is decided, I felt that it was important for our members to know what changes are currently in the works. If I get more information, I will update the guild.



Several of our members attend the national festivals regularly. Many perform and/or teach workshops. I don't know if there will be an opportunity to give input to P of A ,but if it is something you feel strongly about, this might be a goodtime to let your thoughts or concerns be known.

Wherever the festival is being held, though, you should make it a point to go if you can. The festivals are where you really get to network with puppeteers around the country as well as all over the world. So go to the festivals! That is where it's happening!





Rediscovering A National Puppetry Treasure: The Puppets of Perry Dilley

Who wants to find a buried treasure, or unearth a valuable discovery in a cluttered attic? We do! In mid-June this year, Michael Nelson, editor of the San Francisco Bay Area Puppetry Guild newsletter, received an interesting email from a woman named Sarah Dessler. It began,"Do you know anyone who is interested in a bunch of puppets that belonged to my mother's family?"

Nelson immediately thought of me, the current historian for the guild. I also wrote the book: <u>A Century of California Puppetry</u>, or How The West Was Strung, with fellow puppeteer Kevin Menegus. He forwarded Dessler's email to me, and we quickly discovered the importance of her request. That "bunch of puppets" turned out to be a treasure trove of Perry Dilley puppets in three suitcases that had been secreted away in an attic for 43 years.

Sarah, daughter of Ellen Dessler, was clearing out her mother's house to put it up for sale. Ellen is the daughter of Berkeley puppeteer Grace Wickham (1901 - 1993), who spent many years performing with Perry Dilley (1896 - 1968) and his wife Grace Stearns-Dilley (1897 - 1982). For close to 30 years Wickham worked side by side with Dilley and his wife, manipulating these memorable figures. When Grace Stearns passed, she bequeathed Perry's remaining puppets to her close friend Grace Wickham.

The Perry Dilley Puppet Theater favored the style of the French Guignol hand puppets. This style gave the puppeteers manipulating Dilley's creations, which were modeled in papier mâché or plastic wood, the ability to better control the puppet's movement, producing an elegant, intimate performance. One critic described it this way: "Some artists can play upon the emotions of an audience with a violin or a piano, or even a saxophone; Mr. Dilley's instrument is a bit of paper and wood and cloth, but his melody is just as impelling."

A Short History of Perry Dilley

Perry Dilley had a long and fascinating career. He began as an apprentice in puppet theater at the age of 20, under the tutelage of Vaudeville marionettist Daniel Meader (1856 - 1929.) When Meader died, his widow left all his trick marionettes to Dilley, but we don't know what happened to them. Perhaps someday they'll be discovered in another attic?

Dilley went on to study at the University of California in Berkeley. While there he met Grace Stearns and later Grace Wickham, and the three of them opened a puppet theater in a studio setting at 728 Montgomery Street in San Francisco. Dilley and Stearns left California for two years, 1924 and 1925, to present puppet shows in Ohio at the short-lived Cleveland Play House Puppet theater. They then returned to San Francisco and Montgomery Street. Eventually all three moved to Berkeley.

After reestablishing himself in the Bay Area, Dilley taught puppet arts at the University of California and at Mills College in Oakland. Perhaps his finest achievement was making a set of marionettes for Ellen Van Volkenburg's 1924 San Francisco presentation of "A Midsummer Night's Dream." Van Volkenburg, founder of the famous Chicago Little Theater, is credited with coining the term "puppeteer" for her puppet performers. After all, if men who wrangled mules were called "muleteers," why not call people who wrangle puppets" puppeteers?"

Historically Important Women in Puppeteering

Another important fascinating facet of our discovery was centered around two women of American puppetry: Grace Stearns and Grace Wickham. The two Graces were mostly responsible for performing Dilley's shows at booking events and private parties. Dilley preferred to stay home and make the puppets and teach puppetry at his two academic positions. He mostly performed in the evenings for special showings at the theater, and in his later life for the monthly shows the Dilleys did at their home in Berkeley, which in 2020 was declared a Berkeley Landmark.

Grace Stearns-Dilley was a theatrical actress as well as manager of the theater. She was also a published playwright and wrote many of Dilley's puppet shows. Grace Wickham was an actress, puppeteer, poet, playwright and costumer. She also performed in the '20s with Fannie Goldsmith's traveling marionette shows when they needed an extra hand. During this time period, women master puppeteers were often not given the same recognition as their male counterparts who were in the spotlight, and their contributions often forgotten to history. We are so excited to have learned about their involvement with these historic puppets, and to be able to share some of their stories.





Dilley and The Puppeteers of America

One last historical tidbit I'd like to mention is Perry Dilley's importance in the development of American puppetry and The Puppeteers of America in the 1930s - '40s. While most puppet companies featured marionettes, during this decade Dilley became an expert on hand puppets. He and his close friend Paul McPharlin (1904 - 1948), puppeteer, publisher, and an honorary president of the Puppeteers of America, published many articles about Dilley's work for The Puppetry Yearbooks and other special edition books printed by McPharlin.

There are quite a few photos of Dilley's work in these editions. Dilley wrote articles about how to work a hand puppet, designing puppet productions, and the history of puppetry, as well as an historical bio-article on his beloved mentor Daniel Meader. As someone who has personally studied these writings and enjoyed the few available photos of his work, it was exhilarating to be able to touch, perform, and study the puppets and personal memorabilia that were unearthed in the three suitcases from the Dessler family attic. To be able to put my own hand into, and bring to life, a puppet that these three puppet masters had performed so well decades ago, is humbling.

A Treasure Trove of Puppet History


Of course you want to know what was in the suitcases from Ellen Dessler's attic. We found approximately 68 puppets, 36 black and white photos from Dilley productions, 29 very carefully typed original puppet plays, and 30 printed programs, many of which featured Dilley woodcut illustrations, as well as articles from magazines, newspapers and reviews. The puppets, although well preserved since the Wickham family did not allow the kids to play with them, are in various degrees of disrepair from the constant performances they endured.

For many years, older San Francisco guild puppeteers have lamented the disappearance of these puppets, although many others found their way into private collections and puppetry museums such as The Center For Puppetry Arts in Georgia, The Detroit Institute of Arts in Michigan and The International Puppetry Museum in Washington. Perhaps some of these recently rediscovered items will eventually find a home there? The Wickham family has honored me and Kevin Menegus with the responsibility of cleaning, some restoration, and finding loving homes for these long-lost friends. Some of these puppets are 100years old, and some possibly even older. They are a valuable part of our puppeteering history, both in California and beyond.
